ADVOCACY TIPS FOR JANUARY

ONE

OTDA ERAP portal CLOSED on January 20th, 2023 due to lack of funds. OTDA (Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance) is currently processing eligible ERAP (Emergency Rental Assistance Program) applications submitted through November 30, 2022. This means that if a tenant submitted an ERAP application through OTDA *before* November 30, 2022, then OTDA will be denying or approving the application soon. Eviction proceedings should be stayed (temporarily stopped) if there is a pending ERAP application until there is a final decision including going through any appeals process. The **Towns of Islip, Hempstead, and Oyster Bay have a separate portal where residents can apply.** See the information below. For the New York State Program, applications from subsidized housing tenants whose rent is limited to a certain percentage of income (e.g. section 8) are not currently able to be paid. State law requires that these applications be paid after all other eligible applications can be paid regardless of the date their application was submitted. For the Oyster Bay and Hempstead programs, subsidized housing tenants may apply but only to the extent of the tenant's paid portion of the rent and utilities that remain after adjustment by the subsidy provider for changes to household income. If you receive a decision on your ERAP application that you disagree with, make sure to appeal within thirty (30) days by calling 844-691-7368 or filling out the OTDA online application form. To apply and determine eligibility, visit the <u>OTDA website</u>.

OTHER RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Suffolk and Nassau County DSS- The Department of Social Services has programs available to provide help with receiving shelter or rent arrears to prevent homelessness. Please visit <u>https://otda.ny.gov/workingfamilies/dss.asp</u> to find the contact information for your local Department of Social Services.

Nassau Suffolk Law Services, in partnership with Empire Justice Center, can now assist Nassau and Suffolk residential tenants with housing-related legal problems (like eviction) and a household income of up to 80% of the Area Median Income. Services are available through this partnership regardless of immigration status. Please call the office closest to you to see if you are eligible for legal services. Interpreters are available. New Tool Helps Family Members Avoid Improper Debt Collections by Nursing Facilities: The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) recently issued a resource for family members and caregivers of nursing home residents. Federal law prohibits nursing homes from requiring residents' family or friends from assuming personal financial liability of residents' expenses. Nursing homes often illegally add language to admissions contracts requiring financial liability of a family member prior to admission. The <u>CFPB</u> <u>Know Your Rights Tool</u> includes language that caregivers should look for in nursing home contracts like holding the caregiver as a "responsible party" or "joint and severally liable." The tool also reaffirms residents' and caregivers' right to refuse to sign a nursing home contract that holds anyone other than the resident personally liable for nursing home costs. It also provides information on getting help with debt collections issues from a longterm care ombudsman, legal aid, state nursing home survey agencies, state attorney general's offices, and the CFPB's complaint process.

Nassau Suffolk Law Services' Consumer Debt Legal Assistance Project provides legal assistance to persons who are experiencing consumer debt problems, especially in matters of credit card and medical debt including nursing home debt. Services may include litigation defense and representation, phone advice, and/or referral for further services, including bankruptcy where appropriate. Residents of Nassau can call 516-292-8100. THREE

Improperly held security deposits will be returned by Fairfield Properties after settlement with New York Attorney General's Office. New York law requires landlords to provide an itemized list of any deductions on security deposits within 14 days or else a security deposit must be returned in full. If a landlord does not follow the law as described above, a tenant may sue their landlord for the security deposit in <u>Small Claims Court.</u> A tenant may also make a <u>rent security complaint</u> with the New York Attorney General's office as an alternative to Small Claims Court. The 2022-2023 Emergency benefit opened on January 3, 2023.

If you are eligible, the Emergency HEAP Benefit can help you heat your home if you are in a heat or heat related emergency.

Emergency HEAP benefits and eligibility are based on:

- income,
- · available resources, and
- the type of emergency

NSLS' Public Benefits Unit provides legal assistance to persons who experience problems with public benefits programs which are administered by the local Departments of Social Services, including:

- Welfare (TANF and Safety Net)
- Medicaid
- Food Stamps (SNAP)
- Child Care Assistance
- HEAP
- Emergency shelter for the homeless
- Unemployment insurance appeals and overpayments
- Other emergency assistance programs

We also assist low-income households in establishing Supplemental Needs Trusts to eliminate the Medicaid spend-down and assist homeless families to obtain rent supplements from DSS to enable families to leave the shelters or retain permanent housing.
